Tape to Lose: a guide for the self-destructive

An audition tape for school or a job prospect is a statement about yourself: make sure that it says what you want it to about you, your standards, your depression, your self-destructive attitude. There is never time to prepare repertoire properly; everyone knows that, including those who will listen to the tape. So, go ahead and record the rep, even though you don't know it; it will make a BIG impression. Here are some other rules to follow:

- 1. Record on your little brother's Tape'n'Play; there's no need to get good, expensive equipment; no one will ever know the difference.
- 2. Record yourself in a room full of rugs, drapes, and heavy furniture; you can add reverb later electronically.
- 3. If you can, run the pitch up by speeding the tape up a little; those who listen to your tape will be surprised that you can play the rep in different keys!
- 4. Make sure to leave the submission of your resume and application to the last moment; they might feel sorry for you and give you a break.
- 5. It doesn't have to be your most recent playing; last year's audition tape, edited to include the new rep, will do just fine.
- 6. Do not sacrifice technical perfection for musicality. A musical tape will sound lively, full of character and enthusiasm, whereas a technically perfect tape shows everyone that YOU don't take risks. Extra tip: Splice in some old Primrose recordings for the hard parts.
- 7. Make sure that the tempi you select for the excerpts are extreme and bizarre; that way you will stand out in the listener's memory.
- 8. Save your best playing for the practice room; be sure to hold back when you make the tape.
- 9. Be sure to prepare properly for the taping sessions; late night after a heavy meal, or better yet, an all-nighter, will produce the impression you want.
